
FANTASTIC ROOM 5!

MAKING PLACEMATS!









Using the small muscles of the hand for coloring within the lines is important for developing the "pencil grip" muscles and it also works on focus and attention. Textured coloring has been included too- coloring over different templates is a fun way to work on endurance to keep coloring until the student can see the image appear! Using different stencils (shape, letters) is a good way to incorporate using two hands together while coloring. Finally, we included some scissor skills by cutting shapes to glue onto the placemats.
